


## **November Newsletter**

## Sunday Gospel



The people stayed there before the cross watching Jesus. This Sunday we celebrate the feast of Christ the King and when we read this scripture we think about the kingship of Jesus. Jesus' kingship was not one of worldly power, but rather one of love and mercy. Jesus forgave those who crucified him and showed mercy to the criminal who was truly sorry. 


### **Pilgrims of Hope Journey**

**RRSA Article of the Month – Article 19: The Right to be Safe and Protected from Harm**

This month, our RRSA focus is **Article 19**: *"Every child has the right to be protected from being hurt, and to be kept safe."*

During the last week we have been thinking about anti-bullying and how we are each called to be a power for good. We have considered how we can develop positive relationships in school based on dignity and respect, take a proactive approach to preventing bullying and also support people who have faced or are facing bullying.

There are a number of articles that link to Anti-Bullying Week including Article 2, which states that the convention applies to all children without discrimination, Article 12 which says that children's views should be taken seriously in all decisions that affect them, Article

13 which says that children have the right to express their thoughts and opinions and especially Article 19 which says that all children should be protected from violence and abuse.

During our workshops we have learned how Article 19 applies to our lives and how we can help keep ourselves and others safe.



Our RRSA steering group have been busy examining the Global Goals for Sustainability and sharing their learning with members of the community. The group have shared why so many people live in poverty and go hungry and are encouraging the school to take steps to support children around the world. The children have invited parents and governors to get involved so that the message is shared!





Live Simply




As a school we are committed to living simply by answering the call for us to care for our common home and stand in solidarity with our sisters and brothers around the world.

## Our Learning





### Year 1





## Year 2

Well done, Year 2 — we're sure Super worm would be very proud of your super letters! ✨










#### Year 4


The learning has continued in Year 4 with the children learning about the special vocations of Moses and David and considered how they are called to live in the example of Christ in









## Sporting News

## Attendance



As a school we believe in the importance of attendance and work closely with Birmingham LA and parents to ensure that all children are in school every day. Research has shown that absence disrupts the education of the individual pupil and the whole class. Children who do not attend regularly:

- do not achieve well in exams
- find it difficult to maintain friendships

- are more likely to become involved in crime
- miss out on opportunities in further education and the world of work?

We have recently had a number of families contact us about leave in term time. As you already know a 2013 amendment to The Education (Pupil Registration) Regulations 2006, means that Head Teachers may no longer authorise leave during term time except where the circumstances are exceptional. This is in accordance with Birmingham Local Authority's 'Leave in Term Time Guidance.' If families choose to take leave in term time they may be subject to legal procedures.

**A letter has been sent out explaining attendance procedures and I would ask that you read it carefully and consider the implications if you chose to take children out of school during term time. We are aware that families have been fined by Birmingham LA and this can be a significant amount of money and we do not want to see our families in this situation. Birmingham has informed us that a number of fines have been issued to families because of holidays.**

The DfE Guidance states that penalty notices can include lateness after the register closes. Please ensure your child is in school on time and ready to learn every day.

*National threshold when it is appropriate to issue a penalty notice*

*All state funded schools must consider whether a penalty notice for absence is appropriate in each individual case where one of their pupils reaches the national threshold for considering a penalty notice. Schools should not have a blanket position of issuing or not issuing penalty notices and should make judgements on each individual case to ensure fairness and consistency across the country. The threshold is 10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a rolling period of 10 school weeks. A school week means any week in which there is at least one school session. This can be met with any combination of unauthorised absence (e.g. 4 sessions of holiday taken in term time plus 6 sessions of arriving late after the register closes all within 10 school weeks). These sessions can be consecutive (e.g. 10 sessions of holiday in one week) or not (e.g. 6 sessions of unauthorised absence taken in 1 week and 1 per week for the next 4 weeks). The period of 10 school weeks can also span different terms or school years (e.g. 2 sessions of unauthorised absence in the Summer Term and a further 8 within the Autumn Term).*

Every school day counts



## IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND CARERS

### Why is regular school attendance and good punctuality so important for my child?

Regular attendance at school means that your child can make the most of their education and improve their chances in adult life. School can also help your child's social skills such as making and developing friendships.

The link between attendance and attainment in school is clear. The more a child is in school the more they increase their opportunity to fulfil their potential.

Good punctuality is important. For example, if a child arrives 15 minutes late at school each day, they lose almost 2 weeks of education over the year. Good punctuality also helps your child get into good habits for when they enter the world of work.

Lateness can cause your child embarrassment and, in some circumstances, can count as unauthorised absence.



### How can I help my child enjoy school and attend regularly?

Be organised, have a plan, be consistent and involve your child!

You should:

- ensure they have an appropriate bedtime routine
- create good routines for mornings at home so that your child can arrive punctually and are properly equipped;
- avoid absence from school wherever possible – try to make doctors and dental appointments out of school hours
- make time to encourage and show interest in school work, friendships etc.
- attend school open evenings and functions
- Create a calm space for them to do homework, check they understand the homework and that it has been completed.
- share any education concerns your child or you may have with the school staff as soon as possible
- set realistic boundaries

### Holidays/Leave in term time

Holidays in term time are not allowed. Parents/carers must apply for the authorisation of any leave prior to travel or their children could be reported to the council as missing in education.

Leave for other circumstances such as bereavement or family illness abroad may also not be authorised. Informing the school does not mean the leave is agreed. In the event of a genuine family emergency, parents should avoid requesting more than 5 school days absence. Leave due to weddings is unlikely to be authorised.

Two weeks unauthorised holiday/leave means at least 50 lessons missed that will never be repeated.



### What does the law say I must do as a parent/carer?

Once your child is registered at a school, you are legally responsible for making sure they attend regularly. This means your child should not have any unauthorised absence as this would constitute an offence in law.

When attendance doesn't improve after support or, when a minimum of 5 days unauthorised holiday/leave is taken, legal action can be taken.

Courts can fine parents/carers up to £1,000 per child and for repeat offences the court can fine parents/carers up to £2,500 per child or impose a prison sentence of up to 3 months.

In many cases, but not all, parents/carers can discharge an offence by paying a penalty notice of £160 for each parent per child, discounted to £80 if paid within 21 days. For a family of two parents/carers with 3 children that would be at least £480.

### Where can I get help and advice?

If you need support in relation to your child's attendance, help is available. Please make an appointment with the school to discuss your concerns.


Most difficulties can be resolved informally, but the staff can also arrange an early help assessment or make a request for support to Birmingham Children's Trust if necessary, with your consent.

School nurses can also be helpful if your child has a medical condition or has a lot of time off due to illness.

### E-safety tips from Mr Yasir



#### **E-Safety Reminder: Keeping Children Safe on Roblox**

Roblox is a popular online gaming platform for many children, offering creativity, social play, and fun. However, because it is an online environment, it's important for families to stay aware of the risks and take simple steps to keep children safe.

#### **Key Tips for Parents:**

- **Check Privacy Settings:** Ensure your child’s account is set to the appropriate age so that Roblox automatically applies safer settings. You can also restrict who can chat or join your child in games.
- **Enable Parental Controls:** Use Roblox’s parental controls to limit interactions, block inappropriate content, and manage spending on in-game purchases.
- **Talk About Online Behaviour:** Remind your child never to share personal information, including their real name, school, location, or passwords.
- **Be Aware of In-Game Chat:** Even with filters, inappropriate messages can sometimes slip through. Encourage children to tell you if something makes them uncomfortable.
- **Monitor Play:** When possible, take an interest in the games your child plays. Playing together can help you understand the platform and spot any concerns early.
- **Report and Block:** Show your child how to use the report and block features if they encounter unsafe behaviour or unsuitable content.

By staying involved and having regular conversations about online safety, we can help children enjoy Roblox in a safe and positive way.

## Safety

### Home Safety Reminder: Hot Drinks

Hot drinks are a common cause of preventable burns—especially among young children, older adults, and anyone with limited mobility. A moment of distraction can lead to serious injuries, so a few simple precautions go a long way.

#### Key Tips for Preventing Burns

- **Keep cups out of reach** of children—avoid placing mugs near edges of tables or counters.
- **Use travel mugs with lids** when moving around the home to reduce spills and splashes.
- **Avoid carrying hot drinks and children at the same time**, even briefly.
- **Check water temperature** when using kettles, instant boilers, or hot-water taps.
- **Create “no-go zones”** around cooking and beverage-prep areas for kids and pets.
- **Let drinks cool** before serving, especially to children or vulnerable adults.

- **Be mindful of cords** from kettles or mug warmers—keep them short and away from edges.

**If a burn happens:**

Cool the area with **cool running water for 20 minutes**, remove tight items like rings, and seek medical advice if the burn is large, blistered, or affects the face, hands, or a child.




We do not usually inform your parents, teachers or anyone else if you contact the school nurse. We might inform someone if we were concerned about your safety, but we would usually speak to you first. Your messages are stored and can be seen by other healthcare staff who follow the same confidentiality rules. We aim to reply to you within one working day and you should get an immediate bounce-back to confirm we received your text. Texts will not be seen outside of normal working hours. If you need help before you hear back from us, contact a member of school staff or your doctor. Our text number does not receive voice calls or MMS picture messages. We support messaging from UK mobile numbers only (which does not include messages sent from landlines, international mobile numbers and some 'number masking' mobile apps). Prevent the school nurse from sending messages to you by texting **STOP** to our number. Please respect your school's mobile phone policy. Messages are charged at your usual rate.
