RRSA Article of the Month – Article 19: The Right to be Safe and Protected from Harm

Article 19 protects the right of every person to hold opinions freely and to seek, receive, and share information and ideas without interference. It emphasizes that freedom of thought and expression is essential for human dignity, democracy, and equality, and must be respected for people of all backgrounds and generations.

This week we have stopped to remember 'Holocaust Memorial Day' - a time to remember the six million Jews and millions of other victims who were persecuted and murdered due to hatred, discrimination, and the denial of basic human rights. It reminds us of the dangers of silence, censorship, and intolerance, and the importance of standing up against injustice.

Together, Article 19 and Holocaust Memorial Day teach us that freedom, truth, and human rights must be protected across all generations. Remembering the past helps ensure that future generations can live in a world where voices are not silenced and everyone is treated with dignity and respect.



Our Learning




Nursery

The children have thoroughly enjoyed a range of activities, including constructing their own houses, creating shopping lists and story maps, designing wanted posters, and even role-playing as the Big Bad Wolf.










Reception

Reception have made a fantastic and energetic start to the new year and our classroom has been buzzing with curiosity, creativity and excitement! This half term our learning has been inspired by our themes Traditional Tales and Transport and Travel. Through much loved stories such as The Three Little Pigs, the children became builders and engineers, designing and constructing strong houses, while Goldilocks and the Three Bears sparked lots of fun as we made healthy porridge and even created a brand-new cosy bed for the bears.

In Phonics, the children are making great progress as they continue to develop their sound knowledge and confidently apply it to their writing. We are so proud of the enthusiasm they show when writing words and simple sentences, and it has been wonderful to see their confidence grow. In Drawing Club, the children have been learning rich, exciting

new vocabulary and using it confidently to create imaginative and detailed pictures. In Maths, we have been mastering number by subitising and exploring parts and wholes, helping children build a strong understanding of how numbers work. Our artistic side has flourished as we created beautiful natural pictures using found materials.

In RE, we visited our Church and reflected on how this year has been declared the Year of the Seed of Hope, thinking carefully how we want to grow in love, kindness, patience, friendship and care for one another, just like seeds growing into something wonderful. Watch this space as we will soon be inviting parents in for a build a vehicle workshop and an exciting fairy tale feast in the forest. It has been a truly magical start to the term and we are so proud of the enthusiasm and joy the children bring to their learning every day.



Year 1

This term, Year 1 have been developing their mastery of numbers using a rekenrek, a hands-on maths tool designed to build strong number sense and confidence with early calculation.

The rekenrek (also known as an arithmetic rack) helps children to see numbers and number relationships rather than rely on counting. By sliding coloured beads, pupils explore how numbers are made up, recognise patterns of 5s and 10s, and develop efficient mental strategies for addition and subtraction.

Through engaging activities such as "Show Me," "How Many More to Make 10?" and number stories, children are learning to think flexibly about numbers and to explain their reasoning. They are also beginning to make clear connections between what they can see on the rekenrek, what they can say, and how they record numbers.

Using the rekenrek has made maths lessons both visual and interactive, supporting our children in becoming confident, curious, and fluent young mathematicians!



By sliding the coloured beads, we've been:

- ✨ Seeing numbers in different ways
- ✨ Making 10 and finding number bonds
- ✨ Solving addition and subtraction problems
- ✨ Talking about how we know our answers

Year 2


Year 2 have made a wonderful start to the new year and are eager and looking forward to learning.

In Geography they have been enjoying learning about the oceans. The children have been exploring where the oceans are in the world and learning their names. They have even learnt a new song to help them to remember the names - Five Oceans Song



They have discovered that oceans are large bodies of salt water and have shown curiosity and excitement when locating them on a map and on a globe. The children will continue to learn about how the oceans are important to our planet and how we can help look after them for our future.

This week in Year 2, we have been busy learning how to write clear and helpful instructions, with a very important topic in mind – how to get a good night's sleep!

To inspire our writing, we enjoyed reading the stories Five Minutes' Peace and Peace at Last. The children carefully wrote step-by-step instructions, thinking about bossy verbs, time words and clear sentences to help the reader follow their advice. They gave some brilliant tips, such as changing into pyjamas, having a calming story, and getting cosy before bed!



In Religious Education, Year 2 have been learning about the **Sacrament of Baptism** and why it is such a special celebration in the Catholic faith. The children focused on the **oils used during Baptism**, learning about their meaning and importance.

Our Year 3 Faith Leaders have been leading our class in Pupil Prepared Prayer Services over the past few weeks.


We reflected on spending time with God, being present and putting distractions aside. We asked ourselves: how often do we truly speak to God? ✨📖





Metal everywhere... but why? Who put it there? We're making predictions: is it there for protection, danger or for a giant made from iron? Let the mystery begin!


Year 4

Year 5 have been busy this term thinking about how they can be 'Builders of Hope' in the year ahead. We have created displays with our mission for the year ahead!




Year 6






FLAGS? KEEP THEM FOR THE WORLD CUP!

Attendance



As a school we believe in the importance of attendance and work closely with Birmingham LA and parents to ensure that all children are in school every day. Research has shown that absence disrupts the education of the individual pupil and the whole class. Children who do not attend regularly:

- do not achieve well in exams
- find it difficult to maintain friendships
- are more likely to become involved in crime
- miss out on opportunities in further education and the world of work?

We have recently had a number of families contact us about leave in term time. As you already know a 2013 amendment to The Education (Pupil Registration) Regulations 2006, means that Head Teachers may no longer authorise leave during term time except where the circumstances are exceptional. This is in accordance with Birmingham Local Authority's 'Leave in Term Time Guidance.' If families choose to take leave in term time they may be subject to legal procedures.

A letter has been sent out explaining attendance procedures and I would ask that you read it carefully and consider the implications if you chose to take children out of school during term time. We are aware that families have been fined by Birmingham LA and this can be a significant amount of money and we do not want to see our families in this situation. Birmingham has informed us that they have issued a fine of over £1400 to a family for taking children out of school for a holiday.

Why Punctuality Matters — And What the DfE Says

Punctuality is more than just arriving on time — it sets your child up for a calm and successful school day. When children arrive promptly, they don't miss important morning routines or first lessons, and they start the day ready to learn. Even being just 5–15 minutes late regularly can add up to several days of lost learning time over a school year, which can affect progress and confidence in class.

The **Department for Education (DfE)** makes clear in its statutory guidance that good attendance — including punctual arrival — is vital for children's learning and wellbeing. Schools, families and local partners all have a role to play in supporting attendance.

Attending school on time every day helps children:

- build strong routines and good learning habits,
- take full part in lessons and school life,
- prepare for future expectations in secondary school and beyond.

The DfE guidance emphasises that regular absence and lateness can reduce learning time and potentially lead to pupils falling behind their peers — and that schools and families should work together to keep attendance high. If a child is late this must be recorded as such on the register and if marked late after the register is closed it will impact on your child's attendance.

As a school we offer a breakfast provision from 8.15am and open the gate from 8.30am so that children can settle in before the start of the day.

If your child is unwell, we don't ask that you bring them in but that you contact school in the morning.

E-safety tips from Mr Yasir



JusTalk Kids Safety Settings & Parental Controls

JusTalk Kids is a messaging and video calling app designed specifically for children. It allows safe communication between approved contacts only, and it's often used by families to stay connected. However, parents still need to set it up correctly to ensure children are protected.

We have included information explaining the safety settings available on JusTalk Kids, including new legal compliance checks, We also walk through every step of setup and safe usage.

Age Rating & Child Safety Warning

Age Rating: Rated 6+ with parental setup.

Why It's Not Suitable Without Supervision: Despite its child-friendly branding, JusTalk Kids can expose children to risks if contacts are not carefully approved or monitored. The app includes chat, video, and photo-sharing features, which could be misused if settings are not properly enabled.

Age Assurance Status: JusTalk Kids does **not currently use biometric or document-based age verification**. It relies on parental device setup, making it **non-compliant** with the UK Online Safety Act, and the EU Digital Services Act (DSA) as of July 2025.

Restrictions Available

1. Contact Management

- **What it is:** Children can only chat or call approved contacts.
- **Why it matters:** Prevents strangers from initiating communication.

2. No Public Search

- **What it is:** Profiles aren't discoverable publicly.
- **Why it matters:** Blocks unknown users from locating your child's account.

3. No Ads or In-App Purchases

- **What it is:** JusTalk Kids has no advertisements or payment prompts.
- **Why it matters:** Reduces distraction and risk of accidental purchases.

4. Photo & Video Sharing Controls

- **What it is:** Parents can disable image/video sharing in chat.
- **Why it matters:** Prevents the spread of sensitive content.

Safety Settings and Why They Matter

- **Blocking & Reporting**

Why it matters: Essential if a contact behaves inappropriately.

Setup: Tap the contact > Menu > Block/Report.

Tip: Always check your child's contact list monthly.

- **Profile Visibility**

Why it matters: Controls if the child's profile is visible to others.

Setup: Go to Settings > Profile Privacy > Set to "Private."

Tip: Keep this enabled at all times.

- **Chat Monitoring**

Why it matters: Lets parents view child conversations.

Setup: Enabled via the parental app dashboard.

Tip: Set up email alerts for chat summaries.

- **Screen Time Limits**

Why it matters: Prevents overuse and promotes balance.

Setup: Use device settings or third-party parental control tools.

Additional Features Parents Need to Know

- **Parental PIN / App Lock**

What it is: Some versions allow locking access behind a PIN.

Why it matters: Prevents your child from changing settings.

Setup: Check **Settings > App Lock** or your device's app settings.

- **Data Storage & Privacy Policy**

What it is: Chats and calls may be stored on JusTalk's servers.

Why it matters: Knowing how long and where data is kept helps manage risks.




TT Rockstars The Clash of The Classes

How to protect yourself and your family from measles

What is measles?

There have been recent cases of measles across the West Midlands. Measles is highly infectious and can lead to serious health complications, especially in children under 1,

pregnant women, and people with a weakened immune system. Birmingham faces higher risks of measles spreading as fewer people have had both doses of the immunisation

What are the symptoms of measles?

Measles usually starts with cold-like symptoms. The first symptoms of measles include:

a high temperature a runny or blocked nose sneezing a cough red, sore, watery eyes

A rash usually appears a few days after the cold-like symptoms. The rash starts on the face and behind the ears before spreading to the rest of the body. Some people may also get small spots in their mouth, particularly inside the cheeks and on the back of the lips. To learn more about symptoms, visit <https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/measles/>.

What should you do if you or your child has suspected measles?

If your child develops symptoms, urgently contact your GP. Please contact the surgery by telephone before visiting and tell the reception staff that you think that your child may have measles. Do not attend the surgery unless you are asked to, nor should you attend A&E. The doctor will advise on what to do, and will make special arrangements to see your child so that if they have measles, they won't pass it on to others.

How can you protect yourself and your family from measles?

The MMRV immunisation, which has now replaced the MMR immunisation, helps protect children against measles, mumps, rubella and chickenpox (varicella).

Children are offered two doses when they are 12 and 18 months old as part of the NHS immunisation schedule. Older children, born on or after 1st January 2020, will be offered one or two doses of MMRV.

A pork-free version of the MMRV immunisation, called Priorix-Tetra, is also available at all GP surgeries.

The MMRV immunisation is safe, effective, and free of charge. It does NOT cause autism – numerous studies have proven there is no link between the immunisation and autism.

The MMR vaccine is still available for older children and adults born on or before 31st December 2019 who were not vaccinated against measles, mumps and rubella when they were younger.

Prevent the school nurse from sending messages to you by texting **STOP** to our number. Please respect your schools mobile phone policy. Messages are charged at your usual rate.
