Parking

We would like to remind all parents and carers about the importance of safe and considerate driving and parking around the school.

We are delighted to announce that The Rosary School has been reaccredited as a UNICEF Gold: Rights Respecting School. We are delighted that the assessing committee recognised the many strengths of the school's work. The report highlighted that the pupils have a wide knowledge of rights and are increasingly aware of how these link to the UN Sustainable Development Goals. Children were able to describe how various articles directly impact on their daily lives such as their right to education, to being safe - including online, to access reliable information, to enjoy a healthy lifestyle, to rest and play and to have their voices heard and to be able to express themselves. Pupils said, "We learn about our rights all the time...you can see them scattered around the school on displays so when anyone new starts they can see them." The work of the steering group was recognised especially their work in promoting sustainable development goals. The passionate commitment of staff and parents was also recognised, with staff recognising that the pupils are "more outward looking and

forward thinking ...the quality of their conversations about children's rights and the wider world show they are better equipped to be global citizens."

Well done to everyone involved on the day and in our daily work. A special thank you has to go to Mr Perkins for his ongoing work in championing RRSA throughout the school.

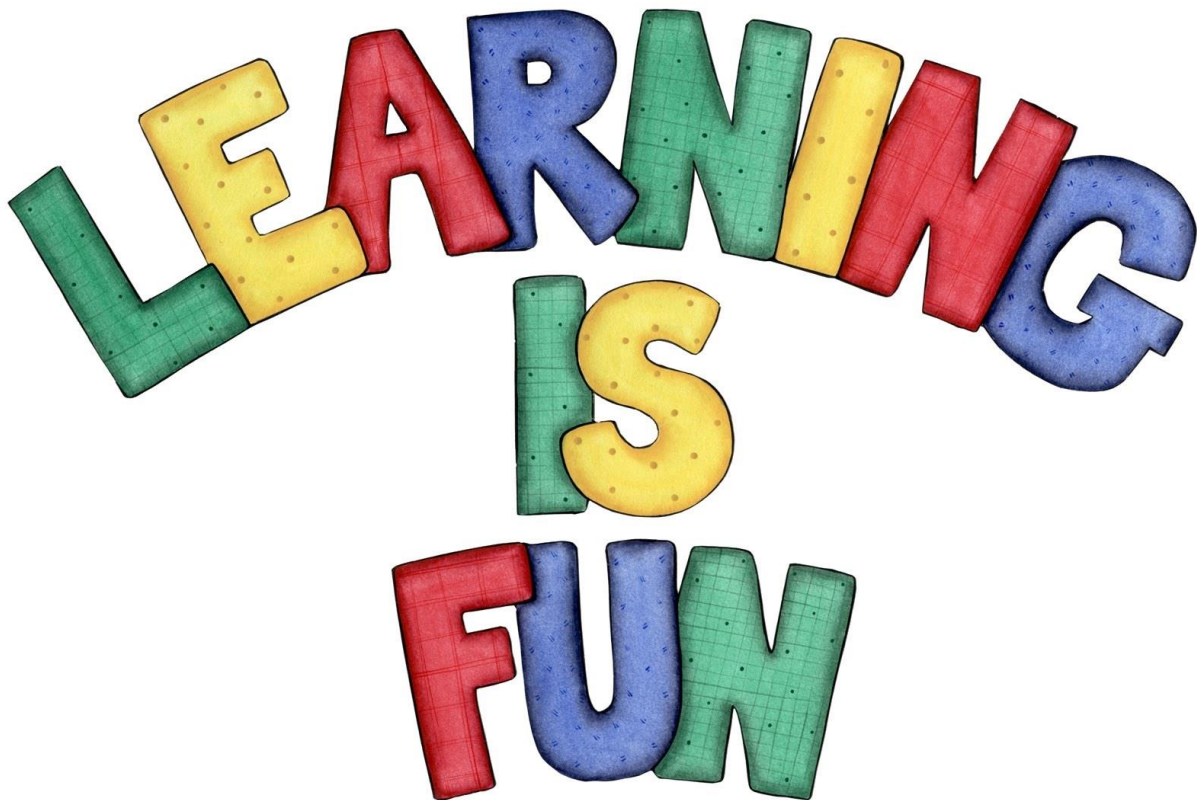

Our Learning



Reception

Reception have had a brilliant start to the summer term and we came back full of energy ready for our final term together!

We've been diving into some fantastic stories including Dear Zoo. The children loved guessing what might be inside each box and had so much fun coming up with their own imaginative ideas. We had everything from cheeky monkeys to enormous elephants!

In class we've been working hard to live out our Catholic virtues of being grateful and generous. It has been lovely to see the children sharing resources helping their friends during activities and celebrating each other's achievements with big smiles and kind words.

We also enjoyed creating our own Easter gardens taking care with our designs and thinking about the meaning of Easter.

The children were amazed at how things have changed and even had a go at washing clothes by hand. We also explored old toys and compared them to the ones we enjoy today.

Year 1

Year 1 went on a hunt for the different types of plants and flowers that are found in and around our school now that spring is finally here. We used some magnifying glasses to get a good detailed view of the different parts of the plants we found and our class iPad to help us to identify what each of the plants were and give us lots of information about them.

We were really interested in the blossoms coming from the tree in the rainbow garden which we learned is a sign of spring and that those types of pink blossoms come from an apple tree.





Year 3

Year 3 have been busy exploring creativity across the curriculum this term. In Art, the children have been learning how to transform 2D shapes into 3D sculptures, experimenting with different materials and techniques to help their structures stand independently. They showed great curiosity when investigating which resources were most effective for joining and supporting their designs.



In English, we have been diving into the story of Jemmy Button as part of our return narratives, using it as inspiration for our own writing. We are placing a strong focus on ambitious vocabulary, and the children have been challenged to include rich phrases such as *lapping waves*, *turbulent tides*, and *vessel* to bring their work to life.

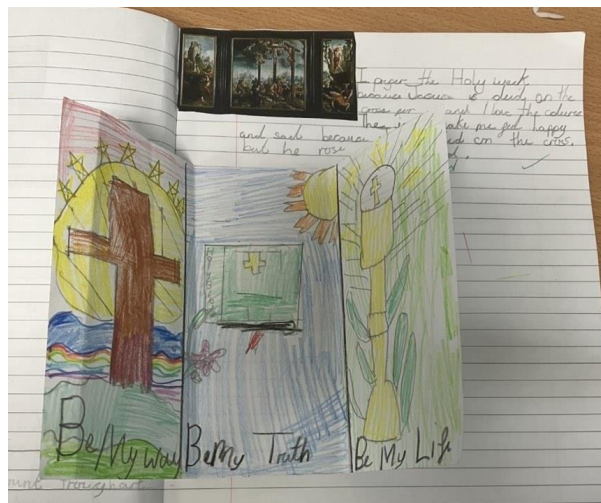
In Art, the children have been exploring how paint can create very different effects. They have applied their knowledge of colour mixing and painting techniques to create a finished piece.



Year 4 have taken part in a thoughtful and creative Easter unit, exploring the meaning of the Resurrection of Jesus through art. The children have developed their understanding of the Easter story, reflecting on its message of hope, new life, and renewal.

Through a range of artistic activities, pupils expressed their ideas and interpretations in imaginative ways. They carefully considered symbolism, colour, and composition to represent key moments and themes from the story. This allowed them to connect their learning in Religious Education with their creativity in art.

The children showed great engagement and sensitivity throughout the unit, producing meaningful and reflective pieces of work. It has been wonderful to see their confidence grow as they explored both their artistic skills and their understanding of the significance of Easter.





Year 5

Big Ideas in Cardboard Boxes!

In Year 5, the children have been getting seriously creative, turning plain old cardboard boxes into amazing installation art. With lots of cutting, sticking, drawing and decorating, each box became its own little world packed with big ideas.

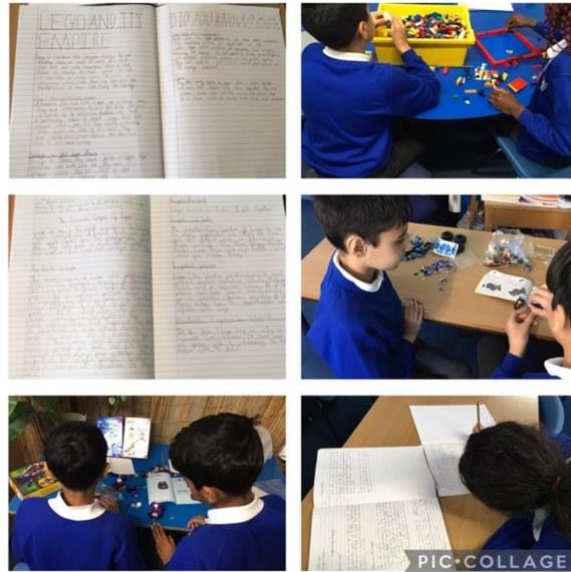






Year 6

Year 1 Phonics - What Parents Need to Know

Parents of Year 1 pupils will soon hear about the Phonics Screening Check, a short assessment designed to measure children's early reading skills. The check will take place during the week beginning Monday 8 June 2026 and is a standard part of the national curriculum in England.

The assessment focuses on phonics — the method children use to read by connecting sounds (phonemes) with letters or groups of letters (graphemes). During the check, each child is asked to read 40 words aloud to their teacher. These include a mix of real words and “pseudo-words” (sometimes called nonsense words), which are used to ensure children are relying on their decoding skills rather than memory.

The check is carried out one-to-one in a relaxed, familiar setting and usually takes just 5–10 minutes. The Class Teachers who know the children well administer the test, helping to keep the experience as comfortable as possible.

Results are used to identify how well children are progressing in phonics. There is a national benchmark, but it's important to remember that this is not a pass-or-fail exam. If a child does not meet the expected standard, they will receive additional support and have another opportunity to take the check in Year 2.

There is no need for formal preparation. However, regular reading at home, practicing letter sounds and building confidence with unfamiliar words can all be helpful. Making reading enjoyable through stories, games and shared reading time remains the most effective support.

As parents if you have any further concerns or questions please see the class teacher or Mrs. Rajbhai our Phonics Lead. The Phonics Screening Check is simply one way to ensure every child gets the help they need to become a confident reader.

Attendance



As a school we believe in the importance of attendance and work closely with Birmingham LA and parents to ensure that all children are in school every day. Research has shown that

absence disrupts the education of the individual pupil and the whole class. Children who do not attend regularly:

- do not achieve well in exams
- find it difficult to maintain friendships
- are more likely to become involved in crime
- miss out on opportunities in further education and the world of work?

We have recently had a number of families contact us about leave in term time. As you already know a 2013 amendment to The Education (Pupil Registration) Regulations 2006, means that Head Teachers may no longer authorise leave during term time except where the circumstances are exceptional. This is in accordance with Birmingham Local Authority's 'Leave in Term Time Guidance.' If families choose to take leave in term time they may be subject to legal procedures.

A letter has been sent out explaining attendance procedures and I would ask that you read it carefully and consider the implications if you chose to take children out of school during term time. We are aware that families have been fined by Birmingham LA and this can be a significant amount of money and we do not want to see our families in this situation. Birmingham has informed us that they have issued a fine of over £1400 to a family for taking children out of school for a holiday. Birmingham have also informed us that taking unauthorised leave on more than one occasion can lead to court action.

Avoid missing important teaching at the start of lessons

Children who attend regularly and arrive on time are more likely to achieve well, build strong friendships, and feel part of the school community.

As part of World Password Day, we have been focusing on the importance of staying safe online, particularly when creating and managing passwords. With so much of our daily lives now taking place digitally, understanding how to protect personal information is more important than ever.

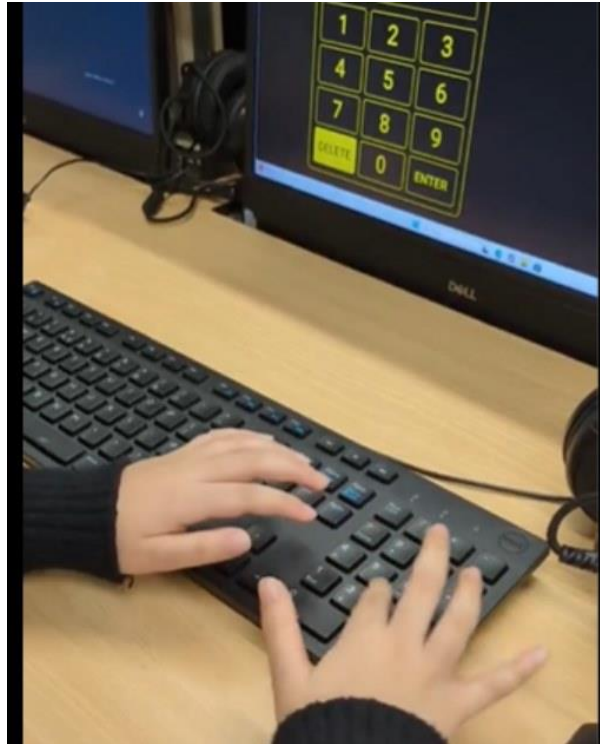
The children have learnt what makes a strong password, including using a mix of letters, numbers, and symbols, and avoiding easily guessed information such as birthdays or names. They also know the importance of keeping passwords private and not sharing them with others, even with friends.

We encourage pupils to think about using memorable phrases to create secure passwords and discuss how regularly updating passwords can help keep accounts safe. This has been a valuable opportunity to build awareness of good online habits and help children take responsibility for their own digital safety.
